# **Summary**

My main research interest is in philosophy of mind and psychology and its intersection with ethics, epistemology and political philosophy. My research engages central philosophical topics while always involving close dialogue with empirical and formal research, from the biosciences and psychology, to economics, computer science, and linguistics. My research focuses on attention, theory of action and consciousness, the relationship between normative and descriptive theories of the mind, and connection between social, technological and psychological structures. After an MA in computational neuroscience, and an MA and PhD in philosophy, I have worked in interdisciplinary environments between philosophy, cognitive science, and other relevant disciplines. I am the author of 31 academic publications, including one single-author monograph, 16 articles or book chapters (13 as single author) in high-ranked journals and book series, and one co-written and edited textbook. My work has been cited 866 times (h-index 10). I regularly give international talks and receive invitations to conferences and workshops (more than 50 international talks to date including two keynotes, book symposia, and two workshops on my work). I am currently leader of an interdisciplinary Centre for Philosophy and the Science (that involves research and teaching components). I am the winner of an ERC Consolidator Grant, I have been principle investigator in a Norwegian Research Council funded project, and core-group member of a Norwegian Centre of Excellence. In the last 10 years, I have acquired more than 3.7 Mill EUR in external funding. I am the winner of a prestigious interdisciplinary Norwegian Research Prize. Experienced supervisor at the level of Research Fellow/Postdoc (2), PhD (4), and MA (10). Widely used as a reviewer in high-ranking journals in my field.
