

Doctoral fellowship

A Doctoral Research Fellowship (SKO 1017) in Ibsen Studies is available at the Department of Linguistics and Nordic Studies, University of Oslo.

The Centre for Ibsen Studies is an interdisciplinary research and documentation centre that aims to promote research on Henrik Ibsen nationally and internationally, and to disseminate knowledge about Ibsen and his works. At present the Centre has three permanent full-time academic positions, a Head of Department, two adjunct professor positions, and one librarian. Four research fellows are currently affiliated with the Centre, and during the year, the Centre is visited by a number of guest researchers for short and long-term stays. The Centre shares its administration with, and is a unit under the Department of Linguistics and Scandinavian Studies at the Faculty of Humanities. The Ph.D. Research Fellowship (SKO 1017) is non-specified within the field of Ibsen Studies, and applicants with projects in the fields of literary studies, theater studies, philology, cultural studies, digital humanities, or film studies are encouraged to apply. The person appointed will be affiliated with the Faculty's organized research training. The academic work is to result in a doctoral thesis that will be defended at the Faculty with a view to obtaining the degree of PhD. The successful candidate is expected to join the existing research milieu or network and contribute to its development. Read more about the [doctoral degree](#).

The appointment is for a duration of three years. All PhD Candidates who submit their doctoral dissertation for assessment with a written recommendation from their supervisor within 3 years or 3 ½ years after the start of their PhD position, will be offered, respectively, a 12 or 6 month [Completion Grant](#).

Qualifications

- A Master's Degree or equivalent in **XX**. The Master's Degree has to have been achieved by the time of application.
- Personal suitability and motivation for the position.

In assessing the applications, special emphasis will be placed on:

- The project's scientific merit, research-related relevance and innovation
- The applicant's estimated academic and personal ability to complete the project within the time frame
- The applicant's ability to complete research training
- Good collaboration skills and an ability to join interdisciplinary academic communities

Applicants who have recently graduated with excellent results may be given preference.

Applicants must submit the following attachments with the electronic application, preferably in pdf format:

- Application letter describing the applicant's qualifications and motivation for the position
- Curriculum Vitae (complete list of education, positions, teaching experience, administrative experience and other qualifying activities, including a complete list of publications)
- Transcript of records of your Master's degree. Applicants with education from a foreign university are advised to attach an explanation of their university's grading system
- Project description, including a detailed progress plan for the project (3 - 5 pages, see [Template for project descriptions](#))

Please note that all documents must be in English or a Scandinavian language.

Educational certificates, master theses and the like are not to be submitted with the application, but applicants may be asked to submit such information or works later.

Short-listed candidates may be invited for an interview at the University of Oslo.
