
Mapping music and nuances in penal exceptionalism from the periphery

In April we hosted a public research seminar and round-table conversation at Oslo University Library, where hip hop artist Belizio (Emil Hortman) shared with us his songs and experiences of making music in prison, and joined by Audun Reithaug from the organisation Musikk i fengsel go frihet (Music in prison and freedom). In May, we will host another screening of Ben Harbert's documentary/concert film Follow Me Down: Portraits of Louisiana Prison Musicians (2012) at UiO's Musicology Department. Shot over the course of two years in three Louisiana prisons, Georgetown ethnomusicologist Ben Harbert weaves together interviews and performances of extraordinary prison musicians – some serving life sentences, some new commits and one soon to be released. Research Design

A major focus of the last few months has been designing our research 'package'. The project will be conducting research in 2-3 prisons in each of three countries: Norway, Iceland and Ireland. Our aim is to combine Áine's experience in ethnographic research with Lucy's experience in practice-based research, in order to explore the experience of music in prison from multiple angles, and to produce a range of research outputs that include the written and the sonic - including academic texts as well as more arts/creative-based (podcast, sound art or radio content). We are aiming to do a pilot session before the summer break, and following that, to carry out fieldwork in the different sites from Autumn/Winter 2023 into Spring-Summer '24.
